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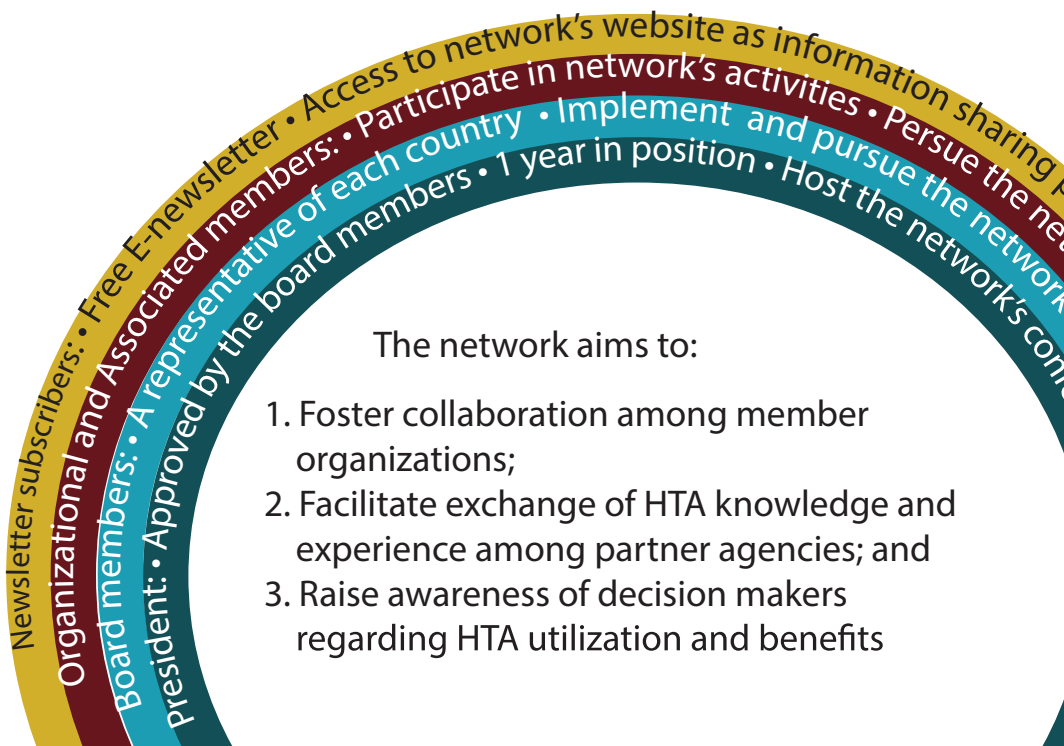
HTAsiaLink was founded in September 2010, the network operates on a voluntary basis, no requirement for membership fee, and no compulsory engagement in particular network activities.

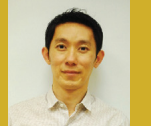
